
Stationary, Permanent, & Not Subject to Change

Shelters, DV Shelters, **Transitional** Housing Programs

Sheltered (100)

temporarily sharing the housing of friends or relatives due to the loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason

<u>Unsheltered (130)</u>

What does homelessness look like?

Students living in abandoned buildings, campgrounds, vehicles, inadequate trailer parks, bus & train stations, substandard housing or abandoned in hospitals

Hotel/Motel (110)

Students temporarily living in a hotel or motel due to lack of adequate accommodations

Definition:

A child or youth who meets the McKinney-Vento definition of homelessness

AND

is not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.

Homelessness Creates Barriers to Education

- Move around & change schools a lot.
- Experience <u>poor health</u>, <u>fatigue</u>, <u>hunger</u>, <u>anxiety</u>, <u>toxic stress & trauma</u>.
- Unable to meet school enrollment requirements.
- Lack clean <u>clothing</u>.
- Not have reliable transportation.

- Not have school supplies or quiet place to study.
- Not have parent/guardian to help them (<u>unaccompanied</u> <u>youth</u>).
- Experience <u>prejudice and</u> <u>misunderstanding from</u> <u>peers and school staff.</u>



HOMELESS STATS

42% of children in homeless families are under age six

By age 12, 83% of homeless children have been exposed to at least one serious violent event

Children experiencing homelessness have 3 times the rate of emotional & behavioral problems compared to their housed peers



Homelessness in early childhood has been associated with delays in language, literacy, and social-emotional development, putting children at risk for later academic problems

Homelessness is associated with an 87% increased likelihood of dropping out of school

There are correlation between adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and adult homelessness

Reduces the ability to respond, learn or figure things out, which can result in problems at school

Increased difficulty in making friends & maintaining relationships

Increased stress hormones which affects the body's ability to fight infection

ACEs affect health through <u>STRESS</u> – prolonged exposure to ACEs (like homelessness) can create toxic stress and damage the <u>developing brain</u> of a child and affect overall health

Lowers tolerance for stress, which can result in behaviors such as fighting, checking-out or defiance

Increased problems with learning & memory, which can be permanent

May cause lasting health problems




Survival Mode Response to toxic stress increased a child's heart rate, blood pressure, breathing and muscle tension. The "thinking brain" is knocked off-line. Self protection is a priority!



Intersection of Homelessness & Education

Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs



SCHOOL =

- Sense of stability
- Access to resources such as food
- In-person human connection





Educational Rights

- Confidentiality under FERPA
- Identification process, HQ, Public Posting (notification)
- Homeless Liaison every district
- School of Origin
- Immediate enrollment
- May enroll with critical documents – immunization, records, etc.
- Transportation assistance
- Few waiver for school activities
- Immediate enrollment in all school meal programs.

- Partial or full credit for work completed
- Transfer of school records within 10 business days
- Equal access to all programs
- Dispute resolution process for homelessness
- Identification & support for 0-5 population

CA law: "the fact that a child is homeless or is classified as an unaccompanied minor, as defined by McKinney-Vento Act, is not, in and of itself, a sufficient basis for reporting child abuse or neglect" [CA Penal Code § 11165.15].26

AB 652 requires school district personnel to base their decision to report abuse or neglect on additional factors besides homelessness.



HOMELESS LIAISONS





- EVERY school district/charter is REQUIRED to designate a liaison to address the educational needs of these students.
- Schools are required to remove barriers to the enrollment, attendance, and academic success of students experiencing homelessness.
- All school-aged children/students
 experiencing homelessness are entitled to the
 same free and appropriate public education
 that is provided to non-homeless.

- Housing Questionnaire, SHQ
 - New Enrollment
 - Data Confirmation
- Self-disclosing
 - Mid year
 - Teacher or other staff
- Code in CALPADS 5.4, 5.5, & 8.1

- Immediate enrollment in the school they last attended (school of origin) or the local school where you are currently staying, even if you do not have all the documents normally required at the time of enrollment.
- Continue to attend their school of origin, if requested by you and it is in the best interest.
- Receive transportation to and from their school of origin, the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children, including free meals and Title I.
- Receive the full protections and services provided under all federal and state laws, as it relates to homeless children, youth, and their families.




Getting The Word Out

Hang multi-language posters & brochures with liaison contact info:

- In school buildings where students & parents can easily read them.
 - To protect privacy, post where students can read them without drawing attention to themselves.
- In your community (ex., campgrounds, agencies, motels, places of worship, libraries, laundromats, markets & pharmacies).

Place posters & brochures in school building entrances, common bulletin boards, counselor/nurses office, hallways, lunch line, locker rooms, restrooms, etc.



Critical Collaboration



- Connect with your School District Liaison or school site designee (if you need assistance reach out):
 - Collaborate around making sure students are offered services and priority enrollment for Expanding Learning Programs.
 - Check waiting lists to see who is an identified students.
 - As families/children/youth share their lives with staff and possibly identify themselves as struggling with unstable housing, share what you know about the rights for McKinney-Vento eligible students and work to connect them with the District Homeless Liaison.
 - Share resources for unstably housed families that are found on your District website (this is required to be in place under AB 27).
